One deck of playing cards.

Rules and Play

- 1. The game The Twenty-Thirty is for one player using one deck of cards. Aces = 1; face cards = 10.
- The game begins by dealing seven piles of three cards face up as shown in the example below.



- The object of the game is to remove all the eards from each pile. Groups of three eards may be removed from the same pile only if the sum is 10, 20, or 30.
- 4. In the example above we could remove Pile 1—Ace of Clubs, Nine of Hearts, and Jack of Diamonds—because the sum is 20. Note that if a pile is depleted it is not restored on subsequent plays.
- 5. Once all sets of cards within each pile that total 10, 20 or 30 have been removed, each non-vacant pile is dealt another card. Then another attempt is made to remove sets of three cards whose sum is 10, 20, or 30. This procedure of replenishing and then attempting to remove sets of three cards continues until all piles are empty (in this case the game is won) or the pack is depleted.
- The game ends when there are no more cards in the pack and when no cards can be removed from a pile. (In this case, the game is lost!)
- Each player is allowed only one pass through the deck.

Variations

- Remove sets of three cards whose sum is 9, 19, 29, or 8, 18, 28, etc.
- Remove sets of two cards whose product is 10, 20, 30, 40, ..., 100.



Fill a bucket or a sink with water. Choose 8-10 items from around the house to test if the objects sink or float. Make a prediction before testing and write down your results.

Physical or Chemical leaves changing colors baking a pie -cutting an apple Make a tomado by filling water nearly to the top of a glass jar. Then add a few drops of liquid soap. Tighten the lid and shake the jar swiftly in a circular motion. Set the jar down and you should see a tornado forming in the center of the jar. Take a pic and send it to your teacher.

Make paper airplanes with someone in your house. Have a contest to see which airplane flies the farthest. Measure the distance if you have a ruler or tape measure.

Sort 10-12 objects around your home into the 3 states of matter: solid, liquids, or gases. Write the items that you sorted on paper into the 3 states of matter. What Cleans Pennies the Best?
Fill some cups with small
amounts of different substances
(dish soap, salt water, ketchup,
mustard, BBQ sauce, vinegar,
plain water, lemon juice & milk).
Drop a penny into each
substance. Make sure the penny
is covered. Leave it for 30

minutes. Then wash and/or wipe each penny off with a paper towel. Write about your results.

Make a hurricane by placing a spoon in a bowl of water. Stir the spoon in a circular motion around the side of the bowl until water is moving around fast. Add drops of food coloring to the center of the water.

What happens?

Gather a group of objects, make predictions on which are magnetic, and which are not magnetic using a magnet.

Make an explosive volcano in a 2liter bottle or can by mixing baking soda and vinegar. (Do this in your backyard). Take a pic and send it to your teacher.



Objective: Design a system to protect an egg from cracking or breaking from a high fall.

Materials: Use anything you'd like! Some ideas include: paper towels, straws, tape, cardboard tubes, paper, popsicle sticks, baggies or old boxes.





Emperor: Thank you. That's very kind.






